

Communicate Stage 3

We always do a Skills Builder badge every term, however it's a bit tricky for us to do them on Zoom.

We know some of you are eagerly working towards your Bronze, Silver and Gold Awards and so you are keen to complete the Skills Builders. Here are the activities for if you want to earn the badge – it is optional.

To earn the Communicate Stage 3 Skills Builder, you need to complete the following challenges -

Beat the butterflies

Have a think about makes you feel nervous. For example, you might feel nervous if you have to speak during an assembly at your school, or you might be nervous during a piano exam, or before a big football match. It's perfectly normal to feel nervous sometimes, but what could you do to help yourself relax and feel more confident?

Put yourself out of your comfort zone and try something that normally makes you nervous.

Exploring emojis

Emojis are pictures that we use to express thoughts, feelings and emotions.

Try and write one of the Guide laws using emojis (the Guide Laws are in your badge book). If you show it to someone in your family, are they able to guess which Guide law you have written?

Your next challenge is to create your own emoji, make sure it has a meaning. What do your family members think of your new emoji?

Try using the string telephone with someone in your family. Are you able to hear each other? Spell out some words using the phonetic alphabet - is your family member able to guess the word you're spelling?
